

### The Original Tarot Learning Edition Workbook

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### → INTRODUCTION —

Welcome to the Learn the Tarot workbook. One of the most daunting obstacles to learning tarot is the amount of information you need to memorize and know in order to read the cards effectively, for yourself or for others. While some people have a natural gift for memorization, many do not.

This workbook has been written and designed to help you learn the tarot in a "knowing" way instead of through memorization. This workbook will take you through a process of getting to know your tarot deck, which can be applied to any deck of tarot cards.



The technique for getting to know tarot cards, or oracle cards, is rather simple. Tarot cards represent archetypes of human experience, which are the common themes of human life across all cultures, and present in every walk of life.

We are all the Fool, taking on life as a leap of faith, an act of foolishness, with unpredictable outcomes and seventy-seven experiences we will repeat throughout our lives. We are all the Magician, coming to crossroads and addressing problems in our lives that will require using all the tools we have available to us to solve our difficulties and overcome our challenges.

We will have many defeats (5 of Swords) and many victories (6 of Wands). We will fall in love (2 of Cups) and suffer financial setbacks (5 of Pentacles). Some cards we will hope to know deeply, like the Lovers, while others we will hope to encounter as few times as possible, like the Tower.

The tarot is the story of human existence; a magical way to learn the tarot is to connect your life experiences to each card in the deck. Once you attach your personal stories to a card, you will find learning to read tarot cards surprisingly easy!

To help you accomplish this task, we have included a deck that has keywords at the top and bottom of each card, to show the upright and reversed meaning of the card.

This workbook will be your tarot journal. It shows each card, provides a brief explanation of the card, a sample real life example from the author's journey, and a lined section for you to write in your personal example. Once you connect your life experiences to each card, you will find you know the card without having to spend time

### ← LET'S GET STARTED! — →

There really is no need for a complicated introduction, when you turn the page, we will begin with the Fool and go through all twenty-two Major Arcana cards. Once you get through the Major Arcana, we will move onto the Minor Arcana and start with the Cups suit, then the Pentacles, then the Swords, and we'll end with the Wands. The Major Arcana cards represent the Spiritual (or Big) Karmas of life and the Minor Arcana cards represent the Mundane (or Little) Karmas of life.

### **←** TAROT READING — **→**

Reading Tarot cards can reveal insights into your past, present, or future. The premise is simple: the Querent asks a question, and then the Reader draws the cards and interprets the results.

Tarot reading has been used for divination since the 1700s, and every Reader develops his or her method for interpreting the cards. There are some fundamentals, but Readers are encouraged to explore and develop their own approach.

### ◆ THE DECK →

The Tarot deck contains seventy-eight cards: twenty-two Major Arcana cards and fifty-six Minor Arcana cards.

The Major Arcana cards represent the archetypical moments that everyone experiences on their journey through life. Everyone begins life as the Fool, and ends life as the Fool.

The Minor Arcana cards represent the actions, thoughts, feelings, and material struggles that we all encounter in our lives.

Four suits and fifty-six cards make up the Minor Arcana. Face cards consist of the Page, Knight, Queen, and King. Each of the four elements belongs to a suit, represented by a specific object:

- •Fire to Wands
- •Water to Cups
- •Earth to Pentacles
- •Air to Swords

And each element corresponds to an aspect of human life:

- •Fire/Action
- •Water/Emotions
- •Earth/Work
- •Air/Thought.

### → SPREADING THE CARDS ─ →

A spread is a layout for the Tarot cards which provides a framework for the reading. Spreads often follow a predefined theme where the position of the cards is relevant to how they are interpreted.

There are numerous different types of spreads. Certain spreads tend to work well for different types of questions. This guide will provide a starter spread, but you can research and find spreads for every type of question. As you become more experienced, consider developing your own unique spreads.

### **←** THREE CARD SPREAD **←**

The past/present/future three-card spread is the best and most used starting spread. This simple spread is ideal for novice Readers. Cards are drawn and read in the following order: 1) Past, 2) Present, and 3) Future.

- 1. The Past: This card symbolizes the Querent's past experiences that pertain to the Querent's question.
- 2. The Present: This card represents the Querent's current situation.
- 3. The Future: This card indicates a possible future goal the Querent should strive for regarding their question or issue. The Querent can shape the future based on their thoughts and actions.

# THE FOOL



Meaning: The Fool represents a leap of faith, which is the action our souls take when we are born and when we die. And, we make many leaps of faith throughout our lives. Therefore, as the Zero card, the Fool is the beginning and ending of the journey through the Major and Minor Arcana. We are the Fool. The Fool archetype is about curiosity and openmindedness, going with the flow of life, and managing our way through the unknown.

**Symbolism:** A young man and his dog travel the land together and he is about to walk off the edge of a cliff. The flower in his hand represents innocence; the dog is likely to grab him and prevent him from coming to harm. The bag

on his staff contains all his possessions and the food he needs for the day.

*Upright:* optimism, a journey without a destination, a new beginning, curiosity, and potential

Reversed: foolishness, gullibility, and ignorance

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

There are so many different moments to choose from that illustrate this card perfectly. Each time it comes up in a reading, a list speed-scrolls through my mind. Today, I will stop on starting my spiritual advising business, which I did in 2013 when a dear friend recommended that I go for it, as a professional astrologer and tarot reader. I took the leap of faith and made a business of my skills when I incorporated (LLC) with the state of North Carolina.

## THE MAGICIAN



Meaning: The Magician represents choices and creative problem-solving, a connection between imagination and reality. The Magician archetype is the first encounter for the Fool, indicating that we must make crucial decisions on our life's journey.

Symbolism: A young magician is in the process of casting a spell. The infinity symbol above his head shows that he has attained elevated knowledge. By pointing at the sky and the ground, he acknowledges the connection between heaven and earth. The wand in his hand, along with the objects of the other suits (pentacle, cup, and sword), shows his command over fire, earth, water, and air.

*Upright*: choices, problem-solving, diverse knowledge, solutions, and cleverness

**Reversed:** deception, conning, mistakes, something broken beyond repair, and failure

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

I have purchased four homes over the course of my life. Each time I go through the home buying process, I feel like a Magician trying to complete a spell that will yield the outcome I desire. So many different factors go into the purchase of a home, involving emotions (the Cup), communication (the Sword), creative energy (the Wand), and of course, money (the Pentacle).

### ◆ Your Personal Connection with this Card →

Which of your biggest decisions required you to use all four elements to get to a solution?


### THE HIGH PRIESTESS



Meaning: The High Priestess represents the knowledge and enlightenment that we attain while overcoming difficulties. The High Priestess archetype is the second encounter for the Fool, indicating that we must learn about our intuition, how to trust it, and when to seek out guidance from others.

Symbolism: A young woman wizened by difficult experiences awaits acolytes who will come to her for guidance. A scroll rests in her lap showing her connection to learned knowledge. She sits between a black and white column, showing her connection to death and life. The pomegranates in the art behind her are the fruit of the underworld. The full moon

in her headdress and the crescent moon at her feet represent her powerful intuition, developed by overcoming hardship.

Upright: divination, wisdom from experience, insight, and counseling

Reversed: gossip, bad advice, incomplete knowledge, and misrepresentation

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

When I think of this card, I think about my adoption. I was adopted as an infant and found out about my adoption at a very young age, around 9. My parents lovingly helped me understand how I came to be adopted and why they wanted me in their lives. Knowing I was adopted shaped much of my youth and how I interacted with and was treated by others, which was not always positive. My adoption gave me a different way of seeing life that deepened my understanding of family.

#### ◆ Your Personal Connection with this Card →

What personal difficulty or difference makes you stand out to others and gives you special insight?

## THE EMPRESS



**Meaning**: The Empress represents the feminine divine, the essence of beauty, abundance, and nourishment. The Empress archetype is the third encounter for the Fool, teaching you about the natural world, how to care for the world, how to nurture yourself, and how to care for others

Symbolism: A regal woman sits on cushions atop a stone throne out in the wilderness. She wears a crown of stars and holds a scepter, they are symbols of her power and divine grace. A heart shield with the symbol of Venus, the planet that rules the astrological sign Taurus, rests beside her outdoor throne. Venus represents the body and Taurus represents the earth. A field of

wheat is in front of her, and a healthy forest behind her. She symbolizes the abundance of both; the grain feeds the world and the forest provides the materials for shelter.

*Upright*: nurturing, abundance, the feminine divine, and sovereignty over the natural order

Reversed: hardships, scarcity, bareness, and neediness

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

Feminine and masculine energy mix in all of us, regardless of gender. The Empress is the nurturing and caretaking energy we seek and provide. I fully realized this card when I became a stay-at-home father after the birth of my daughter. Additionally, I feel connected to this card any time I remember my maternal grandmother, who was a truly caring and nurturing soul to everyone who met her

### ◆ Your Personal Connection with this Card →

When have you found yourself in the role of the caretaker? Who cared for you best in your youth?


## THE EMPEROR



**Meaning**: The Emperor represents the masculine divine, the essence of command, order, and power. The Emperor archetype is the fourth encounter for the Fool, teaching us how to establish order from chaos, how to shape the natural world to our needs, and how to build civilization

Symbolism: A elder man sits on a throne with the heads of four rams, which symbolize his masculinity. He holds an Ankh scepter, representing life and power, and a gold ball, representing earthly wealth and his rulership of civilization. The burgundy cloth around his upper body, and red robe covering his lower body, indicate the energy he wields to maintain

his authority. He wears armor underneath his clothing, shown by the greaves and sabatons on his legs. He wears a crown on his head that he earned; it was not inherited.

*Upright*: authority, the rule maker, order, stability, and sovereignty over society and civilization

Reversed: abuse of power, cruelty, dictatorship, and narcissism

### Author's Personal Connection with this Card

I connected with this card when I was teaching English to freshmen college students. In the classroom, all the power was mine and I was the central authority figure. I made the rules, established order, and had sovereignty over the students under my care each semester.

#### ◆ Your Personal Connection with this Card →

In which situation or circumstance did you take complete control and lead others?


### THE HIEROPHANT



Meaning: The Hierophant represents wisdom attained through scholarship and exploring the world, the learned knowledge we attain in our effort to make sense of life. The Hierophant archetype is the fifth encounter for the Fool, indicating that we need to go beyond intuition and emotion, and use intellect and experience to solve some problems. Or, we need to find someone with those qualities to help us.

**Symbolism**: A priest offers a blessing to two supplicants. He wears the clothing of his station as a learned man; his wand and crown are symbols of holy power. On the alter before him are two keys, indicating he has the keys to divine and mundane knowledge, which he uses

to unlock messages and information for those who seek his wisdom.

Upright: wisdom, authority, knowledge, doctrine, and advice

Reversed: arrogance, elitism, hypocrisy, and charlatanism

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

As it turns out, I am an ordained Priest, with the Order of Melchizedek, and have officiated at numerous weddings. And, I work as a spiritual advisor, so I am very familiar with this card. You do not need my level of involvement in spiritual matters to understand this card and connect with it. There was a time in my life when I collected comic books seriously enough to become an expert, who could answer most questions about collecting and the fictional worlds of Marvel and DC. For a time, I was a Hierophant for this subject matter.

#### → Your Personal Connection with this Card →

What knowledge or skills have you mastered at one time or another in your life where people see you as the expert?


## THE LOVERS



**Meaning**: The Lovers represents partnership, especially a profound connection with someone that is both intimate and romantic. The Lovers archetype is the sixth encounter for the Fool, indicating that we cannot fully experience life until we connect with someone intimately and deeply.

Symbolism: An angel oversees the union of Adam and Eve, acknowledging their relationship. On Adam's side, behind him, is a flaming tree, representing passion and creativity. On Eve's side, behind her, is the Tree of Knowledge with the serpent wrapped around the trunk and woven into the branches, representing awareness and free will. They each bring

something different to the relationship that holds the attention of the divine.

Upright: commitment, status through union, connection, and soul mate

Reversed: jealousy, unfaithfulness, arguments, and separation or divorce

### Author's Personal Connection with this Card

I have been very fortunate to have fallen in love several times over the course of my life. My first deep connection with someone occurred when I was in college working on my undergraduate degree. We met in a history class on ancient Greek culture. It took some time, and some courage, to ask her out after class, but she said yes. After a fairly short period of time going out, I fell deeply in love with her, in a way I would not fully understand until well after the relationship ended. While our commitment to each other did not last, it proved profound for me, as I knew then and know now, that she was truly my first love.

◆ Your Personal Connection with this Card →

Who, in your past, or your present is the lover you think of first when you look at this card?


## THE CHARIOT



**Meaning**: The Chariot represents willpower and drive; the intense focus we need to establish our identities and stand out in important and useful ways. The Chariot archetype is the seventh encounter for the Fool, teaching us how important it is to have conviction and intensity in our lives

Symbolism: A warrior sits in a chariot. Two sphinxes, one black and one white, are at rest, but ready to act when the charioteer commands them. There is a star in his crown and on the cloth at the top of his chariot, indicating his connection to divine will. He waits outside the city, as a protector. He will act when called upon. He may be considered a young prince

who one day could become the Emperor.

Upright: victory, willpower, intensity, drive, and control

Reversed: anger, delay, indecision, and interference

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

A key Chariot moment took place when I decided to tell my father that I no longer wanted to play for the golf team when I was in high school. I had plenty of talent, but not the love of the sport that my father had. He invested a lot of time and money into my skill, but I lacked his passion. Telling him I would not play was a moment when I asserted my will and my desire. To his immense credit he understood that I needed to make my own choice and was proud of me for making my own decision about the sport.

Your Personal Connection with this Card

When did you have to assert yourself, forging ahead against all obstacles?


## STRENGTH



Meaning: Strength represents our fortitude to live life, overcome struggles, and persevere. The journey through life will require strength to live fully and completely. Strength, as an archetype, is the eighth lesson for the Fool, showing us that life is a marathon and not a sprint. We must find the strength within that will help us survive and thrive.

**Symbolism**: A young maiden strokes the head of a lion. They are symbols of civilization and instinct co-existing and supporting one another. The infinity symbol above them indicates that the relationship is eternal. Her white robe represents innocence, and her garland belt and robe are symbols of abundance. She greets the

lion with compassion and he will be her protector.

Upright: power, courage, compassion, and gentle strength

Reversed: weakness, anger, abuse of power, and threat

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

When I see this card, I think of my maternal grandmother. She was the eldest of nine children and functioned as a second mother to her siblings when she was growing up. When I was old enough to know her as Ruby, a woman with a full, rich life story, not just Nana, my grandmother, I understood the quiet strength she had regarding life and helping others who were struggling. She could "soothe the heart of a savage beast."

### ◆ Your Personal Connection with this Card →

Who is a person in your life who taught you strength and showed you their strength in a positive way?

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## THE HERMIT



**Meaning**: The Hermit represents our individual pursuit for personal truth in a world of competing truths. The Hermit archetype is the ninth encounter for the Fool, teaching us that sometimes we must detach from the flow of life to discover ourselves, bringing what we learn in isolation back into the world of social connections.

Symbolism: A elderly man travels across a stark landscape with his lamp lighting the way. He travels forward in search of truth. His head is tilted downward, in prayer, to acknowledge the solemn pursuit of truth. His staff is both for his support on the long journey and defense against any threats. The gray robe symbolizes neutrality

and the absence of emotion; he will learn what he learns and accept the truth no matter what is revealed.

*Upright*: introspection, discovery, wisdom, truth-seeking, and taking time away from society

Reversed: loneliness, escapism, depression, and being cast out

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

In the summer of 1988, I was taking classes at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill and burned out after the first summer session. As a result, I had to drop the classes I planned to take during the second summer session. Fortunately, my family had a home in the mountains of Virginia and I went there and stayed by myself for two weeks. This was before cell phones, and there was only spotty TV reception, so I was pretty much by myself. I used the time to heal and rest, so I could return for my final year and complete it successfully.

### THE WHEEL OF FORTUNE



**Meaning**: The Wheel of Fortune represents experiences and circumstances outside our control. The Wheel of Fortune archetype is the tenth encounter for the Fool, indicating that our existence is a dance between fate and free will. This card teaches the lessons of fate, the external world, and how others with more power than us force us to react.

Symbolism: The wheel itself contains numerous symbols of power. At the top is a sphinx with a sword, showing both the mystery and decisiveness of life experience. A serpent is to the left of the wheel, and a demonic looking spirit is to the right, under the wheel. One symbolizes the potential for sudden death and

the other the "wicked" power of free will. Four angelic beings at each corner symbolize the fixed signs of the Zodiac: a lion for Leo, the bull for Taurus, the woman for Aquarius, and the griffin for Scorpio.

Upright: what is inevitable, destiny, and the passage of time

Reversed: misfortune, powerlessness, and unpleasant circumstances



This card is common in our life experiences, so there should be plenty of examples to choose from. I moved many times when I was young because my father changed jobs as he moved up the corporate ladder. The one that stands out the most happened in 1975, when he took a position in Boston, Massachusetts. I was seven at the time and we were living in Greensboro, North Carolina. One day he and my mom informed me that we were moving up north and I had to start packing my room. The same Wheel of Fortune moment happened again in 1980, when they informed me that we were moving back to Greensboro.

Your Personal Connection with this Card  When has the Wheel of Fortune turned in your favor, or spun against you; and what did you learn?				

# JUSTICE



**Meaning**: Justice represents detached decision-making, logic, and the power of knowledge outside of emotions. Justice, as an archetype, is the eleventh teacher for the Fool, showing us the importance of objectivity and analysis for determining outcomes and making important decisions. Life can be fair if we act with integrity.

Symbolism: A stern woman sits ready to receive complaints and solve disputes. She holds a scale in one hand, representing fairness and logical analysis, which she will use to make her determinations. The sword in the other hand indicates, that once a decision is made, she will offer a clear and final answer that will be

accepted and honored. Her crown is less ornate than that of the Empress, Emperor, Hierophant, and Chariot, showing that her role is among the people, not leading them.

*Upright*: detached decision-making, responsibility, consequences, logic, and cause and effect

Reversed: injustice, missing information, indecision, and bureaucracy

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

I have come to understand this card through my role as a parent. On numerous occasions my daughter and her friends come to me to help settle a dispute between them. I always did, and do, my best to be fair and objective, especially because I want my daughter to learn what a just and fair solution would and should look like.

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When have you had to weigh all the facts and come to a decision, using logic, and not emotion?


## THE HANGED MAN



**Meaning**: The Hanged Man represents knowing sacrifice, when we realize we must accept a short-term difficulty for a long-term gain. The Hanged Man archetype is the twelfth encounter for the Fool, showing us the importance of devotion, surrender, and sacrifice as ways forward that are just as powerful as the willfulness of the Chariot lesson.

Symbolism: A young man hangs upside down, but appears relaxed and calm. He knows he must wait and learn by being patient, as well as by changing his perspective, which is what happens when you view the world from a reversed position. The light around his head symbolizes the insight and wisdom he gains

from his changed viewpoint.

Upright: knowing sacrifice, change in perspective, and patience

Reversed: helplessness, impatience, confusion, and selfishness

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

For me, when I see this card, I immediately think of parenting. I became a parent in 2005. There are many other ways to know this card, but parenting is one of the most direct. I certainly learned more about the sacrifices my parents made on my behalf once I started making the ones necessary to help my daughter have a good life. In 2007, I retired early from my career at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill to become a stay-athome parent, literally sacrificing my career in order to take care of my child.

# DEATH



**Meaning**: Death represents endings in the cycle of life, and the power of regeneration. Death, as an archetype, is the thirteenth encounter for the Fool. This card reminds us that life is finite, which helps us appreciate how well, or poorly, we are doing in our pursuit of life experience and soul growth.

Symbolism: The skeletal figure of death rides across the land collecting souls. No one escapes his visit, as exhibited by a royal man, a priest, a maiden, and a child in the image on the card. His flag has a symbol that is the shape of a rose, representing his role in the cycle of life, also depicted by the rising/setting sun in the background. Death's arrival is always assured,

and rarely welcomed.

Upright: death/rebirth, transformation, inevitability, and cycles

Reversed: arrogance, depression, hopelessness, and severe grief

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card ─ ◆

I realize that the death card often represents the death of a situation, or death of a relationship. But it certainly can represent death itself. I was very fortunate to make it into adulthood without the death of my grandparents or my parents. My maternal grandmother was the first of my close family to die, which did not happen until I was almost 30. I can also recall the moment my first marriage died, which is another key event I associate with this card.

◆ Your Personal Connection with this Card When have you faced a death in your life or the death of a situation?


## TEMPERANCE



Meaning: Temperance represents balance and equilibrium that has the chance to develop with greater life experience. Temperance, as an archetype, is the fourteenth encounter for the Fool, indicating that we need to step back, from time to time, and assess where we are to determine if we are in or out of balance

Symbolism: An angel pours water down from one cup into another, and up from the bottom cup to the top cup, which symbolizes the flow of life down to earth and up to heaven. One foot is in the water and one on the land, indicating the connection between emotions/imagination/ spirit and the physical/practical/limited world. The sun rising in the background and star-like

light behind his head both represent truth and wisdom.

Upright: calm, health, well-being, balance, common ground, and harmonious action

Reversed: imbalance, disruption, anxiety, frustration, and pettiness

### — Author's Personal Connection with this Card ——— Near the time of my Uranus opposition (41), I had a breakdown, triggered by a

severe panic attack that seemed to come out of nowhere. It took me three years to pull myself back out of the depths of that break. In that time, I saw a psychologist who took me through an exercise to help me find calm when I was particularly stressed. She asked me to think of the safest place and time in my life; I thought of my visits with my grandparents when I was a kid. When I was with them, in their mobile home in Clemmons, NC, I was always at peace and blissfully happy.

Your Personal Connection with this Card

Where, when, and with whom have you experienced true peace and tranquility?

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## THE DEVIL



**Meaning**: The Devil represents consequences we face as our choices become more significant the farther into life we travel. The Devil archetype is the fifteenth encounter for the Fool, teaching us that we are responsible for our lives and our choices. If we make selfish choices that harm others, we will not enjoy the outcomes.

Symbolism: Lucifer Morningstar, the Fallen One, watches human souls make choices that slowly change them into demons. The chains around their necks are loose enough to slip over their heads, but they make no effort to escape. The reversed pentagram shows the victory of matter over spirit, which is the improper order of the soul's development.

Upright: self-interest, temptation, consequences, and choice

Reversed: unwise choices, lust, wanton abandon, and manipulation

### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

My strongest memory of a Devil moment occurred when I was in high school and my grandparents were visiting. I was out with them and we were supposed to attend an event at the school, but I wanted to go to the used bookstore and look for comic books. I knew that my grandparents wouldn't say no, so I asked them to take me to the bookstore. When we did get to the event, my father was angrier than I'd ever seen him. He was specifically upset that I had taken advantage of my grandparents and disregarded my responsibility to be where I was supposed to be when I said I would.

◆ Your Personal Connection with this Card → When and how did you pay the price for being selfish?

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### THE TOWER



**Meaning**: The Tower represents sudden, unexpected change that takes something we have built over time and quickly forces us to start over or reset. The Tower, as an archetype, is the sixteenth encounter for the Fool, teaching the lesson that life is a construct; it can "blow up" at any time and force us to make unexpected adjustments.

*Symbolism*: A tower with a crown is struck by lightning and human figures fall from the tower. The dislodged crown symbolizes the inevitable end of any human-made structure. Nothing, and no one, is secure from nature's wrath, which is a greater force than civilization.

*Upright and Reversed*: unexpected change, sudden catastrophe, and traditions failing

# At the time that I hit a rock bottom period in my life I was unemployed and a stay-at-home father needing to get back to work. To try and shift gears in my career, I applied to a Master's program in social work. I already possessed a PhD in English and was an employee of the university where I applied for the program. I did not get in! I remember the shock of reading the denial email and feeling this card immediately. As is so often the case with a Tower moment, being rejected turned out to be blessing in the long run, even though it "blew me up" that day.

## THE STAR



*Meaning*: The Star represents hope, and vision for the future. What do we see as our life's purpose and how do we get to it? The Star, as an archetype, is the seventeenth encounter for the Fool, indicating that we need hope and optimism for the future. We need to have dreams to enjoy this life.

Symbolism: A nude young woman pours water into a pool and onto the land while kneeling beneath a guiding star. The star is her hope, and pouring water into the pool and onto the land shows the connection between the physical and spiritual worlds. Her nudity symbolizes innocence. The fertile land, the healthy tree, and the bird represent life and renewal.

*Upright*: hope, inspiration, promise, purpose, and faith

Reversed: doubts, confusion, delusion, and despair

Of my many Star moments, one that I enjoy connecting to this card is the process of self-publishing my astrology book through Balboa Press. I had long dreamed of writing an astrology book, and my daughter's mother gifted me a publishing package, which I turned into the book Astrology Unlocked. Not all dreams manifest, but this one did, and is out in the world, and I am very happy to know I envisioned it and completed it.

## THE MOON



**Meaning**: The Moon represents the feelings we need to explore and express. The Moon, as an archetype, is the eighteenth encounter for the Fool, illuminating our deepest feelings so we can understand the emotional framework that gets reinforced, suppressed, and shaped by our family and closest relationships.

Symbolism: A full moon with a woman's face inside rests in the top middle of the card, inside of the shining Sun, emphasizing that her light comes from the Sun. The moon sits between two pillars and a dog and a wolf over a waterway leading to the ocean. This position indicates our need to balance and navigate our emotions. The lobster is a shelled creature representing our

need to keep our emotions protected with a hard outer casing.

Upright: dreams, positive emotions, intuition, and soul purpose

Reversed: delusion, nightmares, negative emotions, and despair

# Author's Personal Connection with this Card The Moon card represents our connection with our emotions and the experiences that most deeply affect us. When I think of the Lovers card, I connect it with the person I love. When I think about the feeling of love the person creates and shares with me, I think of this card, and the mysteries of the Moon. I was present at the birth of my daughter, which represented an intense moment of the Moon's energy that began when her mother told me she was pregnant, and continues to this day every time an important milestone comes and goes in our lives.

## THE SUN



**Meaning**: The Sun represents revelation and the light of truth. The Sun, as an archetype, is the nineteenth teacher for the Fool. It teaches us the lesson of honest revelation and how to deal with clear truths in our lives. What do you learn when you see a situation, or a person, for what they really are?

Symbolism: The stern-faced sun looks down upon a boy, riding a horse, in front of a wall with sunflowers growing in the background; his standard is a long red cloth, indicating the power of the life-giving star and promise of youth. His nudity symbolizes innocence, and his flower crown represents his potential power.

Upright: revelation, greatness, vitality, and truth

Reversed: excessive pride, arrogance, blocked action, and lies

#### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

The Sun is about revelation, and understanding the unvarnished truth. The revelation I will choose for this example has to do with the birth of my daughter and becoming a father. A good friend once asked me, "what do you wish you had known before you became a father?" And my answer was, "that I will never be 'turned off'." I was at her birth, and the moment she arrived and cried out, I knew I would never pass a day without a thought or concern for her well-being.

## JUDGEMENT



Meaning: Judgement represents significant and life-changing decisions, as well as the judgements from the world around us. Symbolism: An angel blows her trumpet to call the departed souls for judgment. They answer her call, as they must, and will be judged to determine if they are to be punished or rewarded

Upright: deciding for others, being judged,

consequences, and closure

Reversed: prejudging, stereotyping, lazy thinking, and abuse of power

#### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

Without a doubt, my dissertation defense and being awarded my doctorate in 1996 stands out as one the most profound moments of Judgment in my life. The culmination of twenty-two years of academic work reached a successful conclusion, which is not as guaranteed as you might think. I knew examples of candidates who did not successfully defend their dissertation, and were denied their degree. Thankfully, I was not one of them. On the day of my defense, a committee of four tenured professors judged me to be fit to hold the title of Doctor of Philosophy in English.

## THE WORLD



**Meaning**: The World represents the ending of a cycle to prepare for a new, repeating journey for the Fool (us.) The World, as an archetype, is the twenty-first encounter for the Fool, showing us that life is constantly changing, and we are meant to build on our experiences. In this ending is another beginning.

Symbolism: A semi-nude woman dances in the middle of a garland of vines, having reached the end of a process. The heads of the beasts and the face of the woman represent the four fixed signs of the Zodiac: the bull for Taurus, the lion for Leo, the eagle for Scorpio, and the woman for Aquarius. These fixed signs symbolize the stability needed for new disruptions to begin,

ushered in by the return of the Fool (the zero card).

Upright: fulfillment, completion, conclusion, the sum of your efforts, and success

Reversed: stagnation, failure, and final obstacle


#### ◆ Author's Personal Connection with this Card →

*Symbolism*: Two lovers hold hands and exchange cups and vows, while a spirit animal watches over the ceremonial connection. The caduceus of Hermes is between the cups, symbolizing a contract or negotiation underway.

Upright: attraction, and connection

Reversed: unrequited love, and rejection
